Golden-Winged Warbler Creating New Habitat

Presented by Chris Peters

Ranger Chris Peters will be speaking about Golden-winged Warblers. Chris is the Golden-Winged Warbler Coordinator for VA partnered with NRCS. He will be sharing with us information about the biology of the Warbler, what habitats it frequents, and the restoration efforts of those habitats in Virginia.

Chris grew up in South Central PA, and currently lives in Harrisonburg VA. Chris attended Penn State and graduated with a degree in Forest Management in 2009. He has roughly 8 years of forestry experience, including working with private landowners in VA, NC, MD, PA, & CO. He is currently works out of the Verona NRCS office assisting landowners throughout the state of VA with Golden-Winged Warbler habitat restoration.

FEBRUARY 1st-3rd - VSO TRIP TO THE OUTER BANKS

Make plans to join us for the annual Virginia Society of Ornithology field trip to the Outer Banks. There are always great waterfowl, shorebirds and raptors, along with a wide assortment of land birds. The co-leaders include Bill Akers and Jerry Via. This is a wonderful trip and a long, long time tradition for the Virginia Society of Ornithology. Our club is a chapter of the VSO and there are always some RVBC members on this favorite trip. FEBRUARY 13th, WEDNESDAY, 8:30am - SECOND WEDNESDAY BIRD WALK AT GREENFIELD

Join co-leaders Barry Whitt (309-4353) and Kent Davis (355-6388) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and songbirds. The walk will be mostly flat walk of about 2 miles. We will also cover the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring your spotting scopes! For those that want to stay afterwards, we can lunch at Ballast Point Brewery overlooking the lake. This trip will be repeated on March 13th. Directions: Exit at 150B on I-81 and follow signs to 220 North. Go about one mile and take a left on Commons PKY (formerly Wesley Rd) and then a right on Kingston Rd into the Botetourt Commons shopping center and park at Bojangles.

FEBRUARY 17th, SUNDAY, 2pm - SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT

Meet co-leaders Kent Davis (355-6388) and Linda Cory (580-5214) at the Greenway parking lot on Bennington St next to the bridge over the Roanoke River. After a short scan of the Roanoke River, we will walk over to the Sewage Treatment Plant (STP). Entrance to the STP is by special permit and only on Sundays, and trip participants must all enter at the same time and stay together as a group. This site is one of the best spots for viewing shorebirds in the Roanoke Valley. The property includes impoundments, sludge ponds, mudflats, riparian habitat and woodlands. Besides shorebirds, we can expect to see resident hawks and possibly ravens and fish crows. The walking is mostly flat with a short steep trail. Sturdy waterproof boots are recommended as it often muddy. Directions: From downtown Roanoke at the intersection of Williamson Road and Elm St, go east on Elm (it changes names 3 times) about a mile and take a right on 13th St SE. As soon as you go over the bridge over the Roanoke River, the STP will be on your left. At that point, the street name changes to Bennington and the Greenway parking lot will be on your left. The street has a divider, so you will have to go a little further and do a U-turn to enter the lot. (If you are coming from Riverland Road, take the roundabout and exit onto Bennington. The parking lot will be on the right in about a mile.)

FEBRUARY 23RD, SATURDAY, 7:30am - HIGHLAND AND BATH COUNTIES
Meet co-leaders Kent Davis (355-6388) and Linda Cory (580-5214) at the parking lot
next to Bojangles at Botetourt Commons on Route 220 in Daleville for this exciting
day of birding in Highland and Bath Counties. The target bird is the golden eagle
which has been seen on this trip in the past. We should also see bald eagles and a
good variety of waterfowl. This is a full day event, so please bring lunch, snacks
and drinks. Wear warm clothes and sturdy shoes. And bring your
scope! Carpooling is required due to the limited space at some pull-off areas.
NOTE: Please watch your email in case this trip gets cancelled or postponed due
to weather. There's Roanoke weather and then there's Highland County weather.
Directions: on I-81, take exit 150B and follow signs to 220N. Go 3/4 miles and take
a left on Kingston Rd into the Botetourt Commons shopping center. Bojangles is
next to the Wendy's in the parking lot.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

January 16th – Wednesday Walk at Greenfield – 13 birdwatchers enjoyed this walk with 33 total species. Highlights were 2 Winter Wrens, a Northern Shoveler, Gadwalls, Buffleheads, Hooded Mergansers, Pied-billed Grebes, a Hairy Woodpecker, a Raven, Ruby-crowned and Golden-crowned Kinglets and a Belted Kingfisher.

NEW YEAR'S DAY BIRD LISTS FOR 2019

As announced in the December newsletter and at club meetings, we were all encouraged to start out our year by compiling our own New Year's Day list. This year we had 13 club members send in their New Year's bird list and all of the observations were from the Roanoke area. Their tallies reported 43 species including American Wigeon, Green-winged Teal, Killdeer, Ring-billed Gull, Bald Eagle, Kestrel, Hairy Woodpecker, Northern Shoveler, Gadwall, Bufflehead, Great Blue Heron, Red-tailed Hawk and Belted Kingfisher.

AUDUBON'S GEAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

The 22nd annual GBBC will be held Friday, February 15th, through Monday, February 18th. Details are available at birdcount.org. The Great Backyard Bird Count is a free, fun, and easy event that engages bird watchers to create a real-time snapshot of bird populations. Participants are asked to count birds for a minimum of 15 minutes on at least one of the four days and report their sightings online at birdcount.org. Anyone can take part in the Great Backyard Bird Count, from beginning bird watchers to experts, and you can participate from your backyard, or anywhere in the world. Each checklist submitted during the GBBC helps researchers at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society learn more about bird populations and how to protect them and the environment we share.
