American Woodcock Biology and Migration Study

Presented by AI Bourgeois

This month's talk is timely as the breeding season for the American Woodcock is getting underway. Our speaker, Al Bourgeois will be discussing his lifelong study of Woodcocks in the Maryland and Virginia area. His talk will include results from a three-year research project, the American Woodcock Migration Study, which the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries is participating in with other Atlantic Coast states.

Al Bourgeois is a retired Virginia DGIF Biologist. He worked over 42 years in wildlife management including 30 years with the DGIF as the District Wildlife Biologist for the counties north of Staunton. He received his Bachelor of Science from the University of Maine and a Masters Degree from Michigan State University where his thesis work was on the American Woodcock. Al resides in Churchville with Deb, his spouse of 40 years.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

February 12th, 2nd Wednesday walk at Greenfield

Eight club members joined leader Annie Downing to see 33 species. Highlights were Green-winged Teals, Bufflehead, Pied-billed Grebes, Ring-necked Ducks, Gadwalls, Hermit Thrush, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Northern Flicker, Kingfisher, Eastern Bluebirds (16), Dark-eyed Juncos, Eastern Meadowlark, Yellow-rumped Warblers, White-throated Sparrows, and Eastern Towhees.

February 23rd - Sewage Treatment Plant Bird Walk

Thirteen club members were treated to a great morning of birdwatching with blue, blue skies. 33 species were spotted with highlights being Gadwall, Black Duck, Red-shouldered and Red-tailed Hawks and Kestrel, Downy, Hairy and Pileated Woodpeckers, Yellow-rumped Warblers and a Palm Warbler. Early migrants were spotted such as Red-winged Blackbirds, Common Grackle, Eastern Phoebe and Killdeer. Also present were White-throated Sparrows and Juncos and a Belted Kingfisher.

MARCH 11, 8 AM, 2ND WEDNESDAY WALK AT GREENFIELD

Join Barry Whitt (309-4353) and Annie Downing (520-6027) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and songbirds. Wear water-proof shoes for this 1.5 mile walk and bring your spotting scopes! Directions: Take Exit 150B on I81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on the right.

MARCH 21st, SATURDAY, 6:30 p.m. - WOODCOCK WALK ON BENT MOUNTAIN

Meet Robin Austin (293-9071) at the Bent Mountain Community Center for an evening walk of birding and Woodcock watching. We will visit the boardwalk at the community center (formerly Bent Mountain Elementary school) and then walk the surrounding area. The group will then carpool to a nearby area to observe the Woodcocks that start their courtship flight at sunset. Walking is level, but wear waterproof shoes as we will be walking on the grassy roadside. Directions: The Community Center is at 10148 Tinsley Lane, Bent Mountain VA 24059.

MARCH 28th, SATURDAY, 7:30AM - CRICKET HILL FARM BIRD WALK

Meet Kent Davis (355-6388) and Annie Downing (520-6027) at the Orange Market at Hanging Rock at 7:30AM to carpool to the home of Brian and Martha Murphy in SW Craig County. They have earned a Citizen Conservation award for transforming their farm land into a conservation area for native species. We will be looking for early migrants and nesters. Wear waterproof shoes for walking through wet grasses. Also bring a snack and water as our return time may stretch into early afternoon. Directions: The Hanging Rock Orange Market is at 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of the I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141).
