"Bird Safe and Bird Friendly?"

Presented by Maureen Eiger



This program will talk about simple things you may not think about and easy things anyone can do to protect birds and their environment. Learn how to save money on your bird food bill and still attract birds. How do you create a better feeding station and prevent diseases? Learn what you can do to attract birds to nest on your property. How can you prevent window hits or cat attacks? What should you do if that happens? Is wind and solar power bird friendly? These questions and more will be answered in the program.

Our speaker, Maureen Eiger, is a State and Federally Permitted Migratory Bird Rehabber and the Director of Help Wild Birds which is a non-profit organization that exclusively handles the rehabilitation of birds. She teaches bird rehab classes at statewide wildlife conferences and is a contributing writer to the North American Bluebird Society Journal, The Roanoke Star Newspaper, various Audubon and bird club newsletters and the blog "10,000 Birds". Maureen is an avid birder and Virginia Bluebird Society Board Member. She receives hundreds of bird calls a year from people from all over the country asking for advice to help solve their "bird problems" or answer bird related questions. Thanks Go Fest 2018!



Birding Without Borders: An Obsession, a Quest, and the Biggest Year in the World by Noah Strycker, published 2017.

"In 2015, Noah Strycker set himself a lofty goal: to become the first person to see half the world's birds in one year. For 365 days, with a backpack, binoculars, and a series of one-way tickets, he traveled across forty-one countries and all seven continents, eventually spotting 6,042 species—by far the biggest birding year on record."

What made this book notable for me was that Strycker set himself a very high goal, and a very low budget, spending about \$60,000 for the entire year mostly for transportation, food and lodging, and relied exclusively on contacts made from websites like Birding Pal, Face-

book and local birding groups like ours to help him find his quarry. That's a lot of birds to seek – and never use a professional paid guide.

Strycker's extreme likableness and optimism clearly played a role in finding and getting strangers to help him slide through muddy rainforests, get up on mountaintops and basically, go wherever the birds were. His generosity in acknowledging his debt to his hosts, genuine joy in his journey, sense of wonder in our amazing world, and total lack of pretentiousness set this book apart from many others of its kind. It's all about the birds and the people who helped him find them.

The book leaves you with a sense of hope that although birds are facing unprecedented threats worldwide, there are also more people than ever who care about them and are working to protect them. A positive message for our times. Submitted by Maxine Fraade

FIELD TRIPS REPORTS

9/22 – Harvey's Knob - 18 members visited the regular hawkwatchers to catch the excitement of the migration season. In spite of it being a misty day, 242 raptors were counted including 221 Broad-wings and good looks at 2 Osprey and a Bald Eagle. Just two days prior, 1,388 raptors were counted with a Bald Eagle that day and a Golden Eagle the day before. For further migration data, visit https://sites.google.com/site/bijame/home.

10/10 – Greenfield 2nd Wednesday Walk – Birders experience a cool misty day walking around the lake. 37 species were seen with the better sightings being: 15 Wood Duck, Green Heron, Spotted Sandpiper, Kestrel, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Warbling Vireo and Acadian Flycatcher.

10/13 - The Beaver Pond – 13 birdwatchers trekked to Craig County with our first bird of the trip being a Belted Kingfisher. 31 species were seen including great looks at Palm, Cape May and Yellow-rumped Warblers. Other highlights were first-of-season Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Juncos, and White-throated Sparrows. Also observed were Ruby-crowned Kinglets and the acrobatics of Ravens.

UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS

November 3, Saturday, 8:00AM Waid Park in Franklin County

Meet President Kent Davis (355-6388) at the Waid Park main parking lot for an easy to moderate walk through the park. The park covers 512 acres with a variety of habitat from woodland species to waterfowl. We will be exploring the nature trails and wetland areas surrounding the Pigg River. Wear sturdy, waterproof shoes for possible wet terrain. We should conclude before noon, but there are picnic tables if you choose to bring a packed lunch.

Directions: From Roanoke at Tanglewood Mall, take 220 South and travel 18.5 miles and take the first Rocky Mount exit on the right. Merge onto Business 220, AKA Main St. Go 2 miles and take a right onto 40 going west, AKA Franklin Street. You will zigzag through Rocky Mount, staying on Route 40 West, toward Ferrum. About 2 miles past "The Harvester Music Center", take a right onto Six Mile Post Road at the "40 West Food Fare". In 1.75 miles, take a left onto Waid Park Road. Continue straight passing a small parking lot on the left. Shortly after that, take a left into ahuge parking lot and park at the top right of the lot where you will meet your leader. The address is 701 Waid Park Road, Rocky Mount, VA.

November 14, Wednesday, 8:30AM Second Wednesday Bird Walk at Greenfield

Join Barry Whitt (309-4353) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and songbirds. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 1 mile. Other walking at the property may include the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring your spotting scopes! Some folks may want to visit Ballast Point brewery at 11AM for lunch after the walk. They have a veranda that overlooks the lake. This walk will be repeated on December 12th.

Directions: Take Exit 150B on I81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on the right.

November 17, Saturday, 7:30AM, Rain/Snow date Sunday 11/18 Hanging Rock Raptor Observatory in Union, WV

Meet co-leaders Betty Burke (540-597-3863) and Bob Crawford for a 1.5 hour drive to the Hanging Rock Raptor Center near the Virginia/West Virginia border. The drive time includes a quick pit-stop at the Hanging Bridge Restaurant & Shop in Paint Bank, VA on the way to the observatory. This is an all-day trip, so bring a packed lunch and water. Wear hiking boots for the one mile moderate to steep walk up to the observatory tower from the parking lot. Also, wear layered clothing as we will be cold and windy at 3,800 elevation. Carpooling is a must and there is a port-a-potty at our destination.

The Hanging Rock Raptor Observatory is owned by the US Forest Department and is supported by a non-profit group that monitors the migration of raptors. The same day as this field trip in 2017 produced 16 Bald Eagles and 6 Golden Eagles. The observatory is located on a rocky ridge with a 360 degree view. For more information, visit

Directions: We will meet at the Orange Market at Hanging Rock, 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141). Yes, the Hanging Rock where we will start our trip is not the same Hanging Rock where the observatory is – just a coincidence.

November 30 through December 2 VSO Annual Field Trip to Virginia Beach
