Birdwatching and Landscaping Appreciation in Cuba





Joe Scarpaci is Professor Emeritus at Virginia Tech (2009) and is currently Director of the Center for the Study of Cuban Culture and Economy in Blacksburg. He has held five Fulbright awards (Chile, Uruguay, Colombia), a European Union Madame Marie Curie Fellowship at Aarhus University in Denmark as well as having research support from the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the Social Science Research Council. At the University of Iowa he directed the Latin American Studies Program. Besides two decades on VA Tech's faculty, he has taught at Rutgers Uni-

versity, the Universidad Interamericana de Puerto Rico, and West Liberty University (WV) where he chaired the Department of Marketing and Management.

The upcoming January and February birdwatching trips will mark his 91st visit to Cuba, where he has introduced over 1,000 Americans to the island since 1990. The Birdwatching and Landscaping Appreciation trips in 2020 aim to gather birders, naturalists, yogis, and the curious for a serene look into Cuba's natural and cultural diversity.

Joe lives in Blacksburg with his wife Gilda Machín and their dog Coco. When not leading trips south, he teaches at 4 yoga studios in town, translates for Montgomery County Public Schools, tutors ESL, and serves as the Chair of the New River Valley Chapter of the Sierra Club. OCTOBER 5th, SAT., 7:30AM Birding at Beaver Pond

Meet Eunice Hudgins (389-4056) and Barry and Carol Whitt (309-4353) at the Orange Market at Hanging Rock at 7:30AM to carpool to George and Betsy Barker's "Beaver Pond" in Craig County. Wear sturdy shoes, warm clothes and bring a packed lunch/drink. You can choose to walk around the farm and woods area or do some porch birding overlooking the Barker's many feeders. This property includes a pond with an active beaver lodge, wetland area, open pastures as well as woodland trails. In the past, we have been treated to Rose-breasted Grosbeak, a resident albino Red-Tailed Hawk, Snipe and several butterfly species. Directions: The Hanging Rock Orange Market is at 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of the I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141).

OCTOBER 9th, WED., 8AM – SECOND WEDNESDAY BIRD WALK AT GREENFIELD Join co-leaders Barry Whitt (309-4353) and Annie Downing (520-6027) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for migrants and incoming waterfowl. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 2 miles. We will also cover the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring your spotting scopes! This walk will be repeated on November 13th. Directions: Take Exit 150B on I-81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on the right.

OCTOBER 12th, SAT., 7:30AM, Hanging Rock Raptor Observatory in Union, WV Meet co-leaders Betty Burke (540-597-3863) and Bob Crawford for a 1.5 hour drive to the Hanging Rock Raptor Center near the Virginia/West Virginia border. The drive time includes a quick pit-stop at the Hanging Bridge Restaurant & Shop in Paint Bank, VA on the way to the observatory. This is an all-day trip, so bring a packed lunch and water. Wear hiking boots for the one mile moderate to steep walk up to the observatory tower from the parking lot. Also, wear layered clothing as it will be cold and windy at 3,800 foot elevation. Carpooling is a must and there is a port-a-potty at our destination. The Hanging Rock Raptor Observatory is owned by the US Forest Department and is supported by a non-profit group that monitors the migration of raptors. The target bird is the Golden Eagle, but an array of other birds of prey will be seen. The observatory is located on a rocky ridge with a 360 degree view.

Directions: We will meet at the Orange Market at Hanging Rock, 1823 Thompson Memorial Drive, Roanoke (just off of I-81 at either Exits 140 or 141). Yes, the Hanging Rock where we will start our trip is not the same Hanging Rock where the observatory is – just a coincidence.

NOVEMBER 9th, Saturday, 9am - Pond Hopping in Botetourt

Meet our co-leaders, Tim and Alyce Quinn (312-6844), at the parking lot next to Bojangles at Botetourt Commons on Route 220 in Daleville. We will spend the morning visiting local ponds in search of waterfowl and other avian life. Carpooling is required due to the limited space at some pull-off areas. Bring your scope. Directions: Exit at 150B on I-81 and follow signs to 220N, keeping to the right of the traffic circle. Go 3/4 miles and take a left onto Kingston Rd, then a right into the Botetourt Commons shopping center. Look to the right for Bojangles.

OCTOBER 26th, SAT., 8AM - Fenwick Mines

Meet Educator Bill Hunley (467-3477) at the Orange Market in Hanging Rock at 8:00 a.m. to carpool to Fenwick Mines and surrounds. A favorite of the Roanoke Valley Bird Club, this trip covers a wide range of habitats in a relatively small area. This includes open fields, a small pond, wetlands, a mountain stream and mixed pine and hardwood forests. The Fenwick Nature Trail is one mile of easy walking. We will look for a variety of birds and hope for Red Crossbills which been spotted there in years past. The Orange Market is located at the intersection of Rt 311 and Rt 419 (1823 Thompson Memorial Drive) Salem, VA.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

September 11th - Second Wednesday Walk at Greenfield – 16 Birders enjoyed a great day walking around the lake, woods and grassy field and observed 40 species. Although waterfowl have not returned yet, wood ducks and mallards were seen. Also seen: Great Egret, Great Blue Egret, Cattle Egret, Green Heron, Solitary Sandpiper, Vireos (Yellow-throated, Blue-headed and Warbling), Belted Kingfisher, Raven, a plethora of Tree Swallows, a Nashville Warbler and two Northern Waterthrushes.

Raptors seen at the annual club visit to "The Knob" yielded 161 hawks reported including 2 Osprey, 5 Bald Eagles, 5 Sharp-shinned Hawks, 4 Kestrels, a Merlin and 137 Broad-winged Hawks. Eastern Bluebirds (Sialia sialis) are well known in the United States for their brilliant plumage, sweet song, and use of nestboxes. It is hard to imagine that this species nearly went extinct in the early 1900s because of a deadly combination of management practices that removed the dead tree snags that bluebirds depend upon for nesting, the introduction of exotic species that competed for nesting cavities, and the detrimental effects of pesticides. The recovery of populations across the eastern United States is an example of how everyday citizens can play a role in conservation. The major factor in the bluebird's recovery was the establishment of nestboxes by private landowners across their range.

The sale is open to the public, so please copy this form and distribute it to friends and neighbors. There will be a small supply of extra seed available the day of the sale for those unable to pre-order. You will also be able to purchase 2019 calendars featuring club members' photos, bluebird houses, gently used bird feeders and club merchandise. Refreshments will be served, and experienced birders will be on hand to answer questions.

Orders must be received by October 15 and picked up on Saturday, November 2, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m., at:

If you are unable to pick up your seed on November 2, please make arrangements for someone else to pick it up for you. It's easy to order:

Seed Descriptions

Wild birdseed mixes attract ground-feeding birds such as mourning doves, juncos and sparrows:

• Gourmet Mix: contains millet, sunflower, safflower and thistle.

Sunflower seed is the best all-around food, favored by a wide variety of birds:

- *Black Oil Sunflower*: smaller than the striped, with thinner shell, more kernel and higher oil content; preferred 2:1 over other seed by most feeder birds.
- Sunflower Chips: the heart of the seed, virtually no hull, no mess, and more meat per pound.
- *Striped Sunflower*: many common feeder birds, such as cardinals, jays, grosbeaks, titmice, chickadees, sparrows and finches, as well as squirrels, like this larger, thicker shelled seed.

Specialty feed:

- Nyjer (Thistle): especially good for goldfinches and pine siskins, this seed is rich in nourishing oil.
- White Millet: favored by ground feeding birds such as juncos, towhees, buntings and sparrows.
- Safflower: most squirrels don't care for it, but many birds such as cardinals, grosbeaks and juncos do.
- Peanuts: a favorite of woodpeckers, titmice, chickadees, nuthatches and blue jays.
- Corn: keep the squirrels busy with corn on the cob to keep them away from your feeders.
- Suet: the high fat content helps birds stay warm in the winter.
