#### **Big Spring Day 2022**

It's a go - Big Spring Day returns on Saturday May 7th, 2022! This fun tradition is a count conducted jointly by the Lynchburg Bird Club and the Roanoke Valley Bird Club. About 15 groups of birders will cover designated areas within 7.5 miles of the Big Spring in the Peaks of Otter Picnic Area. This will be our 51st annual count.

Early May in the mountains of Virginia is a wonderful time for spring birding. Migrating birds are heading north from the tropics to their northern breeding grounds. Birds that spend the entire year here are setting up breeding territories and pairing up, which makes them more active, vocal, and easier to observe in their bright spring plumages.

Given last year's success, despite pandemic challenges, we can move forward with holding the count again this year. At the current time, it does not appear that there will be any governmental restrictions preventing our outing. As we did last year, please follow whatever CDC guidelines may be in place on count day regarding indoor (carpooling) and outdoor gatherings. Tally up plans, in-person versus via Zoom, will be determined closer to date.

Past Big Spring Day participants – please contact your group leader to confirm whether or not you are able to attend this year.

## **Field Trips**

#### Catawba Greenway (April 9th, at 9am)

Meet leader Bill Hunley (540-467-3477) in the parking lot at the Catawba Sustainability Center. The trip will involve about a mile of walking on a mostly gravel road as well as small portions of some grassy fields. The target birds will be various species of sparrows (savanna, vesper etc.) and other open country birds. We could get good looks at raptors like kestrel and red-tailed hawks. Directions: Take Rte. 311 towards Catawba 6.7 miles. Turn right onto Rte. 779 (Catawba Creek Road) and drive a half mile to the Catawba Sustainability Center. The group will meet in the parking lot.

#### • 3rd Wednesday Walk at Greenfield (Wednesday, April 20th, at 8am)

Join leader David Frye (248-459-6783) for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake and possibly to the pond beyond. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 1 mile each way. Bring your spotting scope if you have one. Directions: Take Exit 150B on I-81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on right.

## Warbler Road Trip (April 30th, at 7:15am)

Join leaders Tim and Alyce Quinn for one of our favorite trips to see warblers. The group will bird a series of forest service roads between the Blue Ridge Parkway and Arcadia in search of warblers and other Neotropical migrants. This trip usually lasts well into the afternoon, so bring drinks, snacks and a lunch. Dress in layers. There is limited space for pulling off on Warbler Road, so we'll need to limit the number of people and carpool as much as possible. #### **Field Trip Reports**

#### March 16th Greenfield Walk

Report from Dave Frye: Partly sunny skies and mostly birdy conditions welcomed our party of 10 members on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. The group cheered at the sight of the Rock Pigeon that pushed the morning's tally to 56 species! We also heard a rooster crow, but decided not to count it.

Of note on that day were sightings of a Blue-winged Teal, Ruddy Duck, Winter Wren, Northern Harrier, and Fish Crow. The group was happy to see the return of Eastern Meadowlarks and grumbled at the sighting of the Brown-headed Cowbird.

Overall, it was a really nice morning. And where on earth would we have rather been that day?

#### March 19th Woodcock Walk

Report from Robin Austin: We had 19 birders come out on a bit of a windy evening to search for our target bird, the American Woodcock. We started with a walk around the Bent Mountain Center with sightings of some spring arrivals including Tree Swallow, Eastern Phoebe, Chipping Sparrow, Eastern Meadowlark, and Red-Winged Blackbird.

Then on to search for Woodcock. The wind had picked up at our site for the birds which made it challenging to see or hear the Woodcock. A few lucky folks did hear Woodcock but none were seen. Alas, the challenge for finding Woodcock as one birder said, is the fun of the chase. A total of 25 species was recorded by our lister Tim Quinn.



## **Birding Backpacks**

Roanoke Valley Bird Club has a new initiative, and we want you to be part of it!

All over North America, bird clubs have partnered with local libraries to bring birding to new audiences through highly successful Birding Backpacks programs. This is an exciting new chapter in RVBC's outreach. We feel certain it will reap great rewards in opening wider access to birding tools and information in the Roanoke community.

RVBC is creating and donating the Birding Backpacks which will then be checked out like any other media such as books, CD's, DVD's, etc. We will be starting with the county library system and intend to expand to the city and other areas soon.

The Birding Backpack will contain a padded backpack, guidebook, binoculars with case, straps, and lens cleaning cloth, a foldout guide to backyard birds, as well as information about getting started in birding, how to use binoculars, local birding hotspots, birding apps, and other basics.

This is a major undertaking! We have received partial funding from the Roanoke County Friends of the Library and the Roanoke Valley Bird Club. The rest is up to us, our RVBC members. We need member's support for this project to go forward.

Please considering sponsoring an entire Birding Backpack. Or you can sponsor part of one, from the list below. Or make a contribution of any amount to the general backpack fund. We hope to start placing backpacks in libraries by summer. We need your help to make this happen!

The cost of one Birding Backpack is \$200 (all numbers are rounded off). It includes Vortex Crossfire 8x42 binoculars \$140, National Geographic Birds of Eastern North American \$16.00, a padded book bag imprinted with the club and library logo \$25, Sibley's Backyard Birds of the Mid-Atlantic laminated fold-out \$8, and miscellaneous items like laminated handouts \$15.

Enter the amount you want to donate above the box and choose whether donating through PayPal or a debit or credit card. The next page that opens has a space at the top for "Write a note

(optional)". Enter here what you want the donation to be used for. Then enter credit or debit card information. If you click instead on PayPal it will ask your username and password and open up to the "Write a note (optional)" page. Finally, click to complete your donation.

#### Meet a Member: David & Karen Frye


