As our seasons pass, the winter brings an amazing assortment of water birds into our lakes, rivers and wetlands. This multimedia program shows that diversity in all their splendor. Includes all of our wintering Ducks, Mergansers, Geese, Swans, as well as our resident waterfowl and more. Enjoy the beauty of this diverse group of birds and see what makes each species unique.

Bob Schamerhorn is a National Award Winning Nature Photographer, with nearly fifty years of experience. He is a fledgling of the Lynchburg Bird Club, were generous members of that organization, nurtured his passion for art and wildlife. In his youth, he was sponsored three years in a row to the Virginia Garden Club's Nature Camp. After high school, he studied art and design at Virginia Tech and has worked in art related fields ever since. After college, he resided in Bedford County, until moving to Richmond in 2008.

Around that same time, advancements in digital camera technologies rejuvenated his passion for bird photography. Shortly thereafter, his work began to appear in various publications, including Virginia Wildlife Magazine and Calendar covers. Bob's photography has recently received two National Awards, along with numerous other recognitions from juried art shows and photography contests. His fine art nature photography is regularly exhibited throughout the mid-Atlantic at art festivals, and shared through education programs at various clubs. Bob's hope is to educate and inspire the conservation of nature, by capturing and sharing its beauty. He considers himself, "An enthusiast, not an expert!"

Field Trip Reports:

Oct. 3rd, Green Hill Park: Linda Cory and Sissy Logan led 11 members and friends for a walk on the greenway. The group observed 29 species including Scarlet Tanagers (3), Cape May Warbler, Rose-breasted Grosbeak (3), American Redstart, Swainson's Thrush (3), and Indigo Bunting.

Oct. 14th, 2nd Wednesday walk at Greenfield: It was a beautiful, sunny 70 degree day for the group of 11 birders led by Linda Cory. They saw 38 species, including Red-breasted Nuthatch, White-throated Sparrow, Swainson's Thrush (2), Eastern Meadowlark (4), Cape May Warbler (2), Palm Warbler (5), Yellow-rumped Warbler (13).

Oct. 17th, Roanoke Go Fest bird walk on Mill Mountain with leaders Linda Cory and Sissy Logan. Seven participants (members and people from the community) joined them for an enjoyable hour on a cold brisk day to observe 15 species. A highlight was getting good looks at Blue-headed Vireos. A big thanks goes out to Linda and Sissy for helping with community outreach.

Field Trips

You no longer have to RSVP for the field trips unless specified. If there is an unexpectedly large turnout, we can split into smaller groups. Mask wearing will be at the leader's discretion. November 7th, Saturday, 8:30 AM, Mason Creek Greenway

Join Annie Downing (540-520-6027) for a walk along Mason Creek. Meet at the trailhead parking lot on the right on Roanoke Boulevard just before you get to GE if you are traveling west. The trail heads north for one mile, following a scenic creek. Farther north it's a mix of open field and thick trees. The trail dead ends just short of the Lynchburg Turnpike. Total walking: 2 miles on paved greenway.

November 11th, 8:30 AM, 2nd Wednesday walk at Greenfield

Join Annie Downing (540-520-6027) in a walk around Greenfield Lake in search for migrants and waterfowl. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 2 miles. We will also cover the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring a spotting scope if you have one. Directions: Take Exit 150B on I-81 and follow signs to Route 220N. Go about 4 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. Park in the second lot on the right.

November 15th, Sunday, 1 PM, Sewage Treatment Plant

Join co-leaders Kent Davis (540-355-6388) and Linda Cory (540-580-5124) for a walk at the Sewage Treatment Plant. Entrance to the STP is by special permit and trip participants must all enter at the same time and stay together with their leader. This site is one of the best spots for viewing shorebirds in the Roanoke Valley. The property includes impoundments, sludge ponds, mudflats, riparian habitat and woodlands. Besides shorebirds, we can expect to see resident hawks and possibly ravens and fish crows. The walking is mostly flat with a short steep trail. Sturdy waterproof boots are recommended as it often muddy. Directions: Meet at the greenway parking lot off of Bennington St next to the bridge over the Roanoke River. Thirteenth Street SE changes names to Bennington St at the bridge over the Roanoke River which is in front of the STP. After the group has gathered, we will walk or drive over to the STP, so please arrive a few minutes early.
