Upcoming Field Trips

DECEMBER 3rd, SATURDAY 9AM - STARKEY WETLANDS

Join Linda Cory (580- 5214) at the South County Library on 6303 Merriman Road for a walk on the Starkey Wetlands Boardwalk. We will be scouting possible rails and a variety of sparrows. Wear sturdy shoes for walking from the parking lot to the boardwalk below. The boardwalk is a 1/2 mile of level walking although we will do some additional exploring at Starkey Park next door. If time permits, we could choose to also walk along Crystal Creek.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS are not a new idea or limited to the Roanoke Valley Bird Club. The first count was done on Christmas Day 1900 by Frank Chapman, an ornithologist in New York, as an alternative to hunting birds. The count is a census of birds in the Western Hemisphere performed in a "count circle" with a diameter of 15 miles. The count period runs from December 14 to January 5. Observers count every bird seen or heard in assigned areas. All counts are forwarded to the National Audubon Society to provide population data for use in science, especially conservation biology.

Participate in as many counts as you wish. Contact the leaders above to be assigned a territory. If you are a new birder or have not done this before, you will be placed with experienced birders. Get to know your fellow birders and maybe discover a new territory or a new bird. JANUARY 11th, WEDNESDAY at 8:30 A.M. - SECOND WEDNESDAY BIRD WALK AT GREENFIELD

Join co-leaders: Barry and Carol Whitt (309-4353) at 8:30 A.M. for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and songbirds. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 1 1/2 miles. There are benches along the trail for "birding from the bench". COMMUNITY CLOUD FOREST CONSERVATION TRIP - Former VSO President Andrew Dolby has spent years building relationships with researchers and conservationists in Guatemala. One such partner is Community Cloud Forest Conservation (CCFC <u>http://www.cloudforestconser</u> vation.org/) an organization with a growing ecotourism business that also engages in sustainable agriculture training and environmental education programs with the area's children. Andrew is working with CCFC to recruit VSO members for a field trip to the area. The trip will take place from April 1-11 2017 with resident guide Rob Cahill, the son of John Cahill, Guatemala's leading bird expert. The price is \$1,960 for double occupancy and \$2,660 for single occupancy, which covers all in-country transportation, lodging, meals, guide services, and entrance fees. Airfare to and from Guatemala City, alcoholic beverages or personal incidentals are not included. The price is based on a minimum of eight travelers, but the trip will be capped at 10. Deposit due date is January 15, 2017 and final payment will be due February 25. Contact Andrew Dolby for more details (adolby@umw.edu).

WILD BIRD REHAB FUND REPORT FOR 2016

It was a very busy year for injured and orphaned birds that needed to be rehabbed. By May 1st I had already received 99 birds and most of those were baby birds. As of Dec. 1st, 148 wild birds have been rehabbed. Current intakes (just this week) are 2 screech owls and a song sparrow. Comparing this number to last year when I received only108 birds for the entire year you can imagine how much it drained my rehab budget, paying for their food. Vet care and medicine and repairing their cages. I am so grateful that bird club members donated needed items, gave financial support and the BOD allocated \$750.00 from the RVBC bank account towards their care. Without your help I could not have cared for so many birds. To give you an idea of the amount of food involved for rehabbing a bird – a baby songbird eats 100+ mealworms a day. Plus about ¼ cup of fruit, crickets, waxworms, seeds, etc. and depending on the species they also may be fed fish, mice and duck chow. Needless to say the \$750 was used up in a few months, so right now I am doing a t-shirt fundraiser that will close on Dec 7th at https://www.booster.com/buy-a-shirt-and-save-a-bird .You can buy a shirt, make a donation to show your support or do both! Click on the link and see the shirts designed by fellow club member Carol Siler and me. I get a lot of phone calls about birds. My goal is NOT to rehab healthy birds and I was able to successfully renest over 25 nestling birds with the cooperation of their finders. Other calls are general questions like " what to do when a woodpecker is banging on the gutter" or "what kind of seed to buy" or do I know what kind of bird is pecking at their window and why does it do that. I have to say I really appreciate that most people now have cell phone cameras and email. The last time I counted the number of phone calls received about birds (I keep a log) that number was over 300!

Since our December meeting is Member's Night where we get to show off our bird photos. I will do a quick photo presentation of some of the birds that were rehabbed this year and released. I hope you will enjoy it. I really could not have succeeded without your help with paper goods, supplies and financial support.

So from the birds that now fly free (and me) a very big THANK YOU! – by Maureen Eiger, State and Federally Permitted Bird Rehabber. Remember if you find an injured or ophaned bird please call (540-342-4890) for help.

A BIRD WORD ANSWER - A **Pamprodactyl** foot has all four toes in front, as seen in most swifts (Family Apodidae). The first and fourth digits pivot freely forward and backward. Swifts often rotate all four toes forward and use their tiny feet as hooks to help hang while roosting on the walls of chimneys, caves, or hollow trees.
