# **Great Backyard Bird Count, Feb. 17-20**

The Great Backyard Bird Count is an annual four-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one day, or you can count for as long as you like each day of the event. Patterns detected in GBBC data are used to alert scientists to particular

species or questions that may require more detailed follow-up studies.

Plan to count birds for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the count. You can count for longer than that if you wish. Count birds in as many places and on as many days as you like—one day, two days, or all four days. ## Sign Up for Bluebird Monitoring by March 15

The trails are checked once a week, April through August, and it takes a couple of hours each time. It's great fun—just ask anyone who's done it! You'll get to look into the boxes and see babies at all stages of development. Try it—we bet you'll like it!

# Monthly Mid-week Walk at the Cherry Blossom Trail, Botetourt County

Wednesday, Feb. 15, 8:30 a.m. - 10:30 a.m.

Join Laura Beltran (266-3773) at the Cherry Blossom Trail in Botetourt County each month to see how the bird life changes from winter to spring. Off of 220 in Botetourt County, take the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center (across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation). Park at the SECOND parking lot for the Cherry Blossom Trail on the right. The trip involves mostly flat walking for about a mile.

## Cherry Blossom Trail near the Greenfield Education Center, Jan. 18

Even though it was cold and blustery and the middle of the week, we had ten birders plus a photographer from the Roanoke Times (The Times did an article on the controversy of lifting the ban on Sunday hunting and wanted photos of other outdoor users).

We saw 33 species:: pied-billed grebe, Canada goose, American black duck, gadwall, mallard, green-winged teal, ring-necked duck, bufflehead, hooded merganser, American coot, great blue heron, unidentified raptor, turkey vulture, black vulture, northern flicker, downy woodpecker, American crow, blue jay, Carolina chickadee, tufted titmouse, northern mockingbird, eastern bluebird, American robin, yellow-rumped warbler, European starling, junco, northern cardinal, house finch, American goldfinch, eastern towhee, white-throated sparrow, field sparrow, and song sparrow.

### **Backyard Birding**, January 21

Species sighted at Carol Whiteside's home were: northern cardinal, Carolina chickadee, American crow, mourning dove, house finch, American goldfinch, dark-eyed junco, white-breasted nuthatch, song sparrow, white-throated sparrow, tufted titmouse, downy woodpecker, red-bellied woodpecker, Carolina wren, yellow-bellied sapsucker, and eastern towhee.

Highlights: Red-tailed hawks, American kestrels, redhead duck, and two bald eagles.

*January:* Snow Geese were spotted at Layman's Pond and also at Plantation Golf Course.


*January:* A hermit thrush has been visiting Alyce and Tim Quinn's property in Burnt Chimney.


*Jan. 1:* Scott and Laura Spangler spotted an American woodcock at the Botetourt Co. Education and Training Center Greenfield park.

## Friends of Stadium Woods Petition to Protect Forest

Hidden behind Virginia Tech's Lane Stadium is a 15 acre tract of forest known as 'Stadium Woods'. This woodland is a rare fragment of old growth forest that supports white oaks over 300 hundred years old. Stadium Woods provides habitat that provides a vital ecological functions, and is a migration sanctuary for bird species.

## **Upcoming 50th Anniversary Celebration of the Kiptopeke Songbird Station**

In the fall of 1963, six volunteers founded a bird banding station at the old ferry dock at Kiptopeke on the Eastern Shore of Virginia. These founders recognized that the tip of the Eastern Shore was a natural funnel for migrating songbirds on their journey south. They saw the opportunity

for long-term study and the need to address conservation issues. Their vision continues today.

The Coast Virginia Wildlife Observatory took over responsibility for the station in 1997. Through donations and dedicated volunteers, bird banding research is conducted each fall and information is shared with researchers and other interested parties. About 90% of the birds captured there are born in the previous 3-6 months. One of the most difficult parts of the young birds' journey lies just ahead. These birds must fly across the 17-mile mouth of the Chesapeake Bay or return north to get back to the mainland. Birds need to have adequate fat stores and energy to make this journey. Quality habitat in this area is needed to provide food and shelter for the millions of migratory land birds. Many species of songbirds are in severe population decline.

The CVWO are asking for donations. Currently it costs about \$7,000 a year to run the station along with hundreds of volunteer hours. Donations will help ensure the continued operation of the station for the next 25 years.

They are producing a special commemorative booklet with history and photos of the station for wide distribution to visitors and others. Donors at the \$250, \$500 and \$1,000 levels will receive space in the booklet of 1/4 page, 1/2 page or a full page to write a personalized message with photos to recognize this special event. Donations are tax-deductible and \$500 or more includes Life Membership. These donors will also receive a free copy of the booklet. Those donating \$100 or more will be noted in the donor section of the booklet. Gifts of any amount are, of course, greatly appreciated. Donations must be received by March 1, 2012 to be included in the commemorative booklet.
