## Field Notes

## October 9: Sparrow Walk

Six birders led by Bill Hunley started off at Greenfield with the following: song sparrow, eastern bluebird, great blue heron, Canada goose, mallard, tree swallow, American robin, pied-billed grebe, European starling, palm warbler, eastern phoebe, cedar waxwing, yellowrumped warbler, Carolina wren, common raven, blue jay, rock dove and northern mockingbird.
At Gala Wetlands we added the following: American goldfinch, song sparrow, savannah sparrow, wood duck, swamp sparrow, Canada goose, belted kingfisher, pileated woodpecker, green-winged teal, blue-winged teal, American crow, turkey vulture, merlin and northern harrier.

## The Big Sit! Sunday, October 10

We enjoyed a georgeous day for the Big Sit this year. Lots of eating, visiting, and 30 bird species thrown in just for fun. The day's stand-out were red-breasted nuthatch, yellow-bellied sapsucker, golden-crowned kinglet and black-throated blue warbler, and we got great looks at all of them. ## Bluebird Trail Stats

The results from our three bluebird trails are in, and they're very interesting. We fledged more bluebirds than we ever have at Botetourt Country Club since we took over the trail in 2000. The numbers on the Parkway were the highest in the last ten years. But we had fewer bluebirds fledge at Hanging Rock Golf Course than we've ever had since we first established the trail in 2000. Go figure.

To what do we owe the varied results? Who really knows? Certainly the weather conditions were the same at all three. Traditionally we've hosted a lot of tree swallows at Botetourt, but their numbers were down this year (maybe due to the super hot summer?), so that gave the bluebirds more opportunities to nest on that particular trail. There was a lot of construction going on along the Parkway, so why did the numbers go up there? We only had seven nestings of anything other than bluebirds on that trail this year, and no chickadees at all (very unusual for that trail), so maybe bluebirds didn't mind the commotion as much as other species did. But how do we explain the decreased numbers at Hanging Rock? Actually we were only down by a few compared to the last three years, but all those numbers were way down from most of the previous years. We haven't seen any glaring changes at the golf course that would account for the low numbers. Perhaps, like so many of us humans who knew him, the bluebirds were in mourning over the passing of Billy McBride, the long-time Golf Pro there who was instrumental in forming that trail and took such joy in hearing how well the bluebirds were doing every year.

In addition to this year's results for all species that used our boxes, we've included a historical record of the number of bluebirds fledged since 1997 (that's as far back as our records go). At that time we only had the Parkway trail, and most of the boxes were on fences. Because of that, we had a real problem with predation by black rat snakes. So when Tim and I agreed to take over the trail in 1999, the first thing we did was put all the boxes on poles and install predator guards. You'll see how dramatically the number of fledged bluebirds increased when we did that. If you have nest boxes at your house on fences, and if you have predation problems, you might want to consider using our set-up instead. The club makes and sells boxes, poles and predator guards, so give one of us a call if you need one.
