**JANUARY PROGRAM** 

You Will Never Look At The Sky
The Same Again

Approximately 3 to 5 billion North American birds will migrate south in the fall. A large number of raptors will pass through Panama on their way to winter feeding and nesting grounds in Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, Guyana, Suriname, French Guiana, Brazil, Bolivia, Paraguay, Uruguay, Argentina and Chile.

Harvey's Knob Hawk Count participates in this fall raptor migration, counting just a few thousand birds each fall.

Just next to the southern locks of the Panama Canal on the Pacific Ocean side and next to beautiful Panama City, sits a small hill just 653 feet high, Cerro Ancon, one of the major hawk counting sights in Panama. Cerro Ancon has a commanding view of the Panamanian southern coast, the coastal mountain range to the West, the interior mountains to the north, and the city of Panama to the East. Like Harvey's Knob, Cerro Ancon takes part in the great raptor migration count, with single day counts as great as 2 million birds. The birds are almost exclusively Broad-winged Hawks, Turkey Vultures, Swainson's Hawks and Mississippi Kites with far fewer Ospreys, Swallow-tailed Kites and Peregrine Falcons. Black Vultures are not counted, however their numbers are at least as great as the Turkey Vultures. The occasional Northern Harrier, Merlin or Cooper's Hawk wanders by as well. Additional migrating birds such as storks, pelicans and other non-raptor species can be seen.

Blanketed by protected tropical rainforest, Panama is home to diverse wildlife including monkeys, sloths, parrots, toucans and hummingbirds abound around vast blooming forests.

During this presentation, from the vistas of Cerro Ancon, we will visit the 'River of Raptors'. Enjoy the many rainbow colors of some of Panama's most beautiful hummingbirds. In addition witness some spectacular images of other wonderful creatures of Panama.

Explore pictorially this river of raptors, 'You Will Never Look At The Sky The Same Again'.

### January 11th, Wednesday, 9AM Second Wednesday Bird Walk at Greenfield

Join co-leaders Joanne Derryberry and Linda Cory (580-5214) at 9AM for a bird walk on the Cherry Blossom Trail at Greenfield. We will walk around Greenfield Lake in search for waterfowl and songbirds. The walk will be mostly flat walking for about 1 1/2 miles. There are benches along the trail for "birding from the bench". Other walking at the property MAY be limited to construction including the grassy area overlooking the lake or the trail down to the lower pond. Bring your spotting scopes! Meet at the second parking lot at Greenfield on the right across the road from the lake. Greenfield is located on Route 220 in Botetourt County. Directions: Take Exit 150B on I81 and then a right onto Route 11 for a quarter mile. Take a right onto Route 220N. Go 3.8 miles and take a left at the entrance to the Greenfield Education and Training Center, across from the entrance to Ashley Plantation. THIS TRIP WILL REPEAT ITSELF ON FEBRUARY 8<sup>th</sup>.

### January 21<sup>st</sup>, 9AM Ponds of Botetourt

It's time to check out those ducks and waterfowl that are returning to our lakes and ponds! Barry Whitt (309-4353) and Kent Davis (355-6388) will lead us pond hopping. Please bring your scope of you have one and dress warmly. We will meet at the parking lot next to Bojangles at Botetourt Commons on Route 220 in Daleville. Due to construction, 150B may be closed, so follow detour signs or exit 150A and do a U-turn. We will carpool to various ponds in the area in search of winter waterfowl. We should return around 1PM. If the ponds are frozen, we may do other birding in the area.

### Creeks and Rivers of the Roanoke Valley and Surrounds

### February 18<sup>th</sup>, 8AM Highland County Trip

Meet Fred Cramer (890-8026) and Rupert Cutler (345-7653) for this exciting day of birding in Highland County. The target bird is the golden eagle which has been seen on this trip in the past. We should also see bald eagles and a good variety of waterfowl. We will start by traveling north on 220, bird the Blue Grass area near Monterey and bird Lake Moomaw and surrounds. This is a full day event, so please bring lunch, snacks and drinks. Wear warm clothes and sturdy shoes. We will carpool (the fewer the cars, the better) from Bojangles at Botetourt Commons on 220N from I-81 at exit 150B. If exit 150B is closed, follow the detour signs or take 150A and do a U-turn. Please watch your email in case this trip gets cancelled or postponed due to weather. There's Roanoke weather and then there's Highland County weather.
